## **NC4DP Transition**

Many of you have heard or read about the refurbishment of Discovery Place that is in progress this year. As those plans evolved recently, we tried to keep current on how it affected the Amateur Radio Education Center. Finally, the news came that our radio room had to close (temporarily we hope) and the space will become part of an enlarged food service where (the CEO of Discovery Place told me) the goal is to offer healthy food choices to visitors instead of primarily hamburgers and French fries. It was difficult to accept the letter I received in mid-December saying the radio room had to be cleared and there was no plan at this time for a radio room in the refurbished Discovery Place. We had completed seventeen years of showing visitors from all parts of the world about Ham radio including the history, science, math, geography, political science, and public service, which are all part of Ham radio.

An agreement was made that the equipment, fixtures, and amateur radio designated funds, would be transferred to the Mecklenburg Amateur Radio Society who has been our primary sponsor from original concept, to design, implementation, staffing, and funding. The intent is that the station will be used as it always has been, to show Amateur radio to our community and to motivate visitors to learn the applied sciences and principles we operate with. The huge job of dismantling, packing, transporting, and storing the station has been completed with the help of some great volunteers. Special thanks go to our packing crew KG4ENP, K8YC, AD4IE, and our moving crew KI4CXO, W4GRW, KA3VVJ, W4PVT, WB2RHM & Anne. I must add that throughout this task, I've had great support from many of the Discovery Place staff. And when the dust settles a bit, we plan to discuss again a refurbished Amateur Radio Education Center at Discovery Place where I still think it belongs. With that in mind the antenna systems are still intact on the roof so we can just replace those seventeen year old feed lines.

Here is the important part, more important than equipment, location, or money. Before we discuss a new Ham radio room at Discovery Place (or anywhere else) we need a team of great volunteer operators. I have visited with many Hams and their families who have come to Discovery Place just to see us. It's not acceptable to have an exhibit where visitors make the trip and just get a look through a glass window at stuff, when they were expecting to see Ham radios in use. A station that's open for visitors just one or two days a week does not justify the space and effort.

There are some of us who have spent many rewarding days operating the station and talking with visitors and we will continue to do so if we get the chance. I really ask each of you to consider if you could dedicate a regular schedule of time each week or month. Every individual Ham and his particular area of interest is important. An attitude of teaching and interacting with young people of all ages is the most important qualification. One day a week works well for me just because I can. It makes the schedule easy to remember and the drive worth the trip. Some also devote the same half-day each week, or the same weekend half-day each month.

Any level of Ham license is sufficient; you use your own callsign privileges. It's also a great place to use modes and antennas that you don't have at home for things like: Worked All States, DXCC, the new ARRL "Triple Play", or just a regular schedule with some of the various nets. Within the next month or so, before we have discussions with Discovery Place management about a new station at Discovery Place, we really need to know who our volunteer operator team is. # CQCQCQ M2MEN

I was a new kid in town in 1978, I came to town with a Novice license and a '2' in my callsign. Several guys I worked with also were new in town, had callsigns with '2's, and we were all learning about local Ham activities. The first Charlotte Hamfest I went to was the second weekend of March 1979 at the old Civic Center about two blocks from where I worked. The FCC came to town to administer Ham exams. And that's where I got my Technician license and my first new radio. It was a synthesized Kenwood 7600 2 meter FM rig with 10 watts of power. I used a simple dipole antenna taped vertically to the wall beside my desk.

We noticed the 2 meter net on 146.94 every night at 21:00 local, I wondered how long the net had been on the air, but knew it had to have been for many years. A couple of my co-workers had become alternate Net Control Stations (NCS). One had to go on a business trip for a few weeks so he gave me his script (called it a preamble) with orders to fill in for him. I must have read that thing ten times before net time wondering if a new kid with a new Tech license was up to it. It must have sounded like a loose wire in the microphone, but it was really just my shaky finger on the PTT. When my 'friend' returned, another NCS had gone so he took that night leaving me with Tuesday. That's how I got started about 30 years ago.

Of one thing I am constantly reminded; when we hear a station regularly, it's easier to understand the voice characteristic, the accent, the weak, over-driven, or perfect signal, the station's location, and the best part we get to know is the person (therefore the informal QSO part of our net). When we get used to each other, we can understand better when conditions are much worse than normal and when accurate communication becomes important. (I call it voice printing). It really does matter 'when all else fails'.

Today many VHF/UHF nets meet very few times each week. M2MEN has a long history of being there every day. Before the days of email and websites there was plenty of formal traffic and bulletins on the net with many stations regularly originating, delivering, and taking traffic to other HF nets. We all learned from the voices of experience. Because of that, I think it's important to handle formal traffic with correct protocol, like we try to do during ARES events, drills, and an occasional piece of formal traffic on the M2MEN. (A hint to all operators, I'd love to hear more of that now). Today we can still listen and talk with those 'traffic pros' on the daily HF nets, and it's worth the time to do that. We used to deliver our daily net reports using formal traffic protocols. Because there wasn't other formal traffic to handle, the net reports got very repetitive with a limited variety of content, resulting I thought, in learning too many bad habits. That's why now we just do informal net report traffic. Beware, there is a difference between formal and informal traffic.

Today we have some new operators who naturally sound unsure whilst transmitting, many new-comers to our community who need to be welcomed and invited to our activities, and many 'old-fogies like me' who just need to get on the air more, so they know if their radio still works and we know how their station sounds. We also need some (new or old) Net Control Stations; currently there are a few days of the week needing a regular NCS. I love to hear new people jump in as NCS because they learn so much and we get to know them. As I well remember, experience is not required. We have a M2MEN legacy to continue. We still meet each evening at 9:00 local, and still on 146.94 repeater. Be there!
